Twenty-five years already... since the start of this great adventure!

Bold initiative that our dream was targeting... that of saving children from death, with no future prospects and considered pestiferous. Innocent victims of parental opprobrium!

Called upon by the cruelty manifested towards these children, we wished to be actively involved in order to reconstitute the family unit, the one that wants to be responsible, compassionate and loving, the one that animates and warms the heart and which to stimulate our desire to live.

Guided by the desire to abolish the stigmas paralyzing the entire Haitian society and thirsty for truth, we considered it essential to equip biological parents, extended families and communities, through capacity building and destigmatization programs on a large scale, for care, support and protection of victims of HIV / AIDS.

The frustrations followed and the challenges were many. Thanks to the faith that we shared which animated us and guided us like a beacon that leads you to your destination, we raised them and never stopped moving towards the great goals of our shared vision.

Training, awareness and destigmatization were important pillars of our mission around which many community entities gravitated, which in turn restored the knowledge acquired on a large scale for the benefit of our children and families.

2021 - new challenges arise.... food and financial autonomy to safeguard the unique program: the foster home and its experimental and organic farm, which could, over the next few years, become a place of learning, leisure and sharing for schoolchildren from disadvantaged neighborhoods.

- Recognized as "Best Practice" by UNAIDS/UNICEF


